ABSTRACT

India was the first country who had formulated National Family Planning Programme (NFPP) in 1952 to control birth rate and to the level the population. It was not an easy task to implement NFPP in India, As India is having vast ritual views on birth rate and the whole concept was directly attached with spirituals thoughts.

Uncontrolled growth in population is the biggest problem for any developing country. Many of the remedies were taken to crisscross the population growth. Family planning program is an initial step of government used as prevent population growth. Many such programs were accepted by the individuals to check unwanted pregnancies.
